

The Safeguarding Alliance

With safeguarding being paramount in everything we do, we carry out internal audits across all our schools.

In 2021/22 we extended this further by commissioning an external organisation to conduct safeguarding audits. The Safeguarding Alliance has recently conducted an audit at Holderness Academy (HA), Hessle High School (HHS) and Winifred Holtby Academy (WHA) and whilst there are some recommendations, we are pleased with the draft summary report for HA and WHA. We are yet to receive the report for HHS.

Although the reports have not been finalised, strengths include 'a strong culture of safeguarding' within the schools; stakeholders including learners and staff expressed how 'individuals feel safe at the school'; 'leadership of safeguarding is a strength' and 'school attendance is very good with robust processes in place to challenge low attendance'.

At Holderness Academy the audit endorsed our view that the Academy 'has a very good range of interventions (internal and external) offered to support the welfare of pupils'.

At Winifred Holtby Academy it endorsed 'the curriculum of Personal, Social, Health and Economic (PSHE) and Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) illustrates that the school is proactive in terms of teaching pupils about being safe.'

Thank you to Kirsten at Holderness, Joanne at Hessle and Jon at Winifred for your leadership during the audit in your role as Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL). Whilst we have a DSL in each school, it's everyone's responsibility to ensure learners are safe and our school environment is safe, so thank you to all staff, as it's only by working together that we can truly ensure safeguarding remains effective.

Recommendations from the visits are being reviewed and will be addressed by each school, supported by Dave Waterson in his role as Trust DSL.





Teaching and Learning Framework

Colleagues from every Trust school are working together to design a consistent teaching and learning framework. The teaching and learning framework will be underpinned by our core principles and informed by a wide evidence base of proven practice.

The teaching and learning framework will provide:

- a common language that facilitates conversation about teaching and learning across the Trust
- opportunities for teaching staff to see and learn from really great practice
- the expertise and tools, for leaders, to lead constructive conversations on the effectiveness of teaching and learning
- our staff with high quality professional development
- an infrastructure and networks to support our staff –
 e.g. subject networks, coaching

MIS Management

We have now concluded the procurement exercise for a new Management Information System (MIS) across the Trust. Our preferred partner is Arbor Education Ltd, who were selected from the three suppliers who submitted bids. I would like to thank everyone who participated in the process and helped decide how we shape our future in the way we will use our data across the Trust moving forward. More information is being released through the Operations Managers in schools on how this journey of migration will look, in readiness for the new academic year.

School Improvement Team

We're delighted to announce that Jamie O'Brien will be starting with us in September as Director of Improvement and Standards Secondary and Post-16. Amanda Welsh will take up a full-time role at the Trust in September along with Angela Murphy where they join Richard Hill as School Improvement Leads.



Ofsted English research review

With Reading being one of our Trust wide curriculum priorities, the findings of the Ofsted English research review, recently published, should be of interest.

Aspects of effective practice highlighted in the report include:

- strong foundational knowledge for reading, writing and spoken language as essential aspects of the early years curriculum;
- developing vocabulary is fundamental to pupils' progress and narrows the word gap between pupils who are word-rich and word-poor;
- an effective reading curriculum ensures that pupils read large amounts of text and focuses on providing pupils with the knowledge they need for comprehension;
- a reading curriculum incorporating carefully chosen texts of increasing challenge;
- the English curriculum for novices, who are likely to learn more effectively through direct instruction, is structured differently in many aspects from the curriculum for experts.

Keeping children safe in education 2022

The DfE has published the 2022 updated Keeping Children Safe in Education **guidance**, which takes effect from 1 September 2022. Annex F sets out a full list of changes in this version. The changes have mainly stemmed from the consultation the DfE ran earlier in the year on proposed changes to the guidance.

A summary of key changes will be pulled together and circulated via the Trust and School Designated Safeguarding Leads.

DfE: Funding for Mental Health Lead training

The DfE have announced a further £7million in training grants to train senior mental health leads, which aims to provide knowledge and skills to develop a **whole school approach** to mental health and well-being.

We will be exploring the grant and training further in line with our review of the mental health provision we already have in place across the Trust.





Aspiration

Students at Cottingham High School achieved 3 Gold, 5 Silver and 34 Bronze certificates in this year's UKMT Junior Maths Challenge. Raphael So in Year 8 achieved the Best in School certificate and Oliver Sison was awarded the Best in Year 7. Raphael So and Ann Cheng, both in Year 8 will take part in the Junior Kangaroo follow-on competition. Congratulations to all of our students.

Year 6 pupils from all three Trust Primary Schools- Croxby, Keyingham and Penshurst- joined forces when they embarked on their exciting residential trip to Kingswood together. The children enjoyed activities such as climbing "Jacob's Ladder", building campfires and Laser Tag. Even though they were interacting with many new children that they hadn't met before, they showed a tremendous amount of respect and teamwork when doing activities together.

Howden School has been working with the East Riding Sustainable Transport Improvement Programme. The school has recently been accredited with the Bronze award in recognition of their efforts to support sustainable transport, healthy habits and promote well-being and positive mental health.



Shaping positive futures

Year 10 Assistant Prefects and House Captains at Winifred Holtby Academy took part in a six week Aspiring Leaders course delivered by Liz Winn, Head of Education and Business Development at Hull KR.

The aim of the course was to develop team working, listening, leadership and reasoning/influencing skills along with building students' confidence and self-esteem.

Professionals both from Hull KR and other businesses were on hand to broaden students' knowledge of career paths, different types of leadership style and to explain how and why teams need a mixture of people with different skill sets.

Students were fully engaged as the sessions were interactive and fun, whilst being challenging and informative. Over the course of the programme, each student was able to develop and grow as a person and it was fantastic to see them working in groups, identifying both their own and other team members strengths and weaknesses in order for them to function effectively as a team.

The final week of the programme was delivered at the Hull KR grounds and involved the teams touring the stadium and then pitching their project to a panel; the panel was made up of individuals from business, sport, education and charities. Students' families and Winifred Holtby staff were invited to the 'Dragon's Den' style event. The students delivered their presentations in a very

professional way and the judges had a hard time deciding the winner (in fact winners, as they couldn't split them) – huge congratulations to all of the students who took part, they should be very proud for pushing and challenging themselves and coming up with fantastic projects.

The winning teams were:

Black and White Army and SEMICs

SEMICs worked with a representative from Hull and East Riding MIND. Their pitch centred around holding a Sports Day for our Trust's primary schools and focused on the need to support positive physical and mental health in young people. Black and White Army's pitch focused on funding research into Motor Neurone Disease, a cause close to rugby's heart after the diagnosis of Rob Burrows. Their proposal of a Sponsored Walk through the city, supported by Hull rugby players, was the overall winning project and plans are underway to make the Sponsored Walk a reality.
