As we reach the end of an extremely challenging term, I would like to thank you all for your hard work over the last 3 months.

This term has probably been the most stressful that any of us have faced or are likely to experience in our career.

I know the summer term was hard, but I believe the challenge of fully opening our academies to all learners this September, and then keeping them open throughout the second national lockdown, has been more difficult. The fact that we were able to re-open in September was a feat in itself and required a huge amount of planning and preparation in order to ensure that our schools were as Covid-safe as possible. commitment shown at all levels across the Trust over the summer was inspirational and thankfully we were able to welcome all groups of learners back at the start of the term.

Staff and learners were required to quickly learn the new routines and protocols that were put in place to safeguard everyone. Headteachers have told me that the vast majority of our learners returned to school with a positive attitude and that on the whole this has been maintained throughout the term. This is quite an achievement and reflects the good relationships between school and families.

Attendance over this term has been very good and is well above the national average. We have experienced positive test results for staff and learners and, as a result, bubbles have been sent home to self-isolate, increasing the pressure on everyone. Staff across the Trust have risen to the challenges posed by the pandemic and, despite the difficulties, we have been able to maintain quality provision for all through our Blended Learning programme. Feedback from learners and parents has been complimentary, with reference made to the fact that, over the term, the quality of this provision has continued

to improve and develop. The fact that over 400 colleagues have accessed the Blended Learning training programme demonstrates the professionalism and commitment of our workforce.

I know that workload has increased due to the pandemic and Headteachers have reported to me how staff have stepped up to mark to ensure that our schools remain open, keeping children and young people safe, providing pastoral support and continuing to deliver educational provision.

For many learners, school has provided a sense of 'normality' during these stressful times. This link with normal life is really important for the mental health and well-being of us all, but it could not have been achieved without the hard work and dedication of every member of staff across the Trust.

On behalf of the Trust, I would like to thank you for your support and commitment this term and as we look towards a brighter 2021, with the increasing probability of a vaccine, can I wish you and your families a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!

Implementing a

strategy to

improve results

Paul Scott Hessle High School

I am currently a Curriculum Leader for Computer Science at Hessle High School, a Specialist Leader of Education (SLE) for Hull and East Riding Schools and the Computing at School Secondary Community Leader.

I have been teaching for twelve years, six of which have been at my current school. During this time, I have been able to embed Computer Science into Key Stages 3, 4 & 5 as previously it was an option subject where the uptake was not what it could be. Now, we have a large amount of students wanting to study the subject at GCSE and it is starting to prove popular at A-Level too. Our first cohort of Sixth Form students developed a widely praised prototype, which was an Employability Passport App to work alongside the paper-based Employability Passport that supports Careers education around the county.

After the success of implementing a strategy to improve results and uptake at GCSE level, I was asked if I would like the opportunity to apply to become a SLE. Once accepted, I have been able to offer support to schools within and outside the Trust ranging from assessment profile work to improving results. I have really enjoyed this work and thankfully the support has had a positive impact on not just the schools I have worked with but on my own CPD too as there is a lot of good practice going on that you rarely get to see as a relative outsider.

Being a SLE has definitely opened doors to wider ranging projects such as coordinating a County Wide Mock exam project where schools sat the same exam paper, shared results and we created a "where are the gaps" analysis and further support was offered/given to support schools with their delivery of identified topics. As part of my SLE role I was asked to work closely with members of the National Centre for Computing Education (NCCE) on a transition project, which is a scheme of learning that will encompass Year 5 through to Year

8/9 to ensure consistency of approach across the Trust's schools as we deliver aspects of Computer Science to our younger learners, while supporting staff who teach this.

I am very much looking forward to seeing what other exciting opportunities arise throughout our Trust to drive Computer Science forward in the future.
