

Yipiyap

Yipiyap have provided tutors to schools for over 10 years and are unique in employing mainly gap year learners as their tutors. They have a long-standing relationship working with Winifred Holtby delivering tutoring and, in recent years, with several of our other schools.

We are delighted to announce that, from September, all our schools will welcome Yipiyap tutors. The tutors will provide nearly 50 days of tutoring each week or, in other words, approximately 9000 hours of 1:1 or small group tutoring to our learners throughout the year.

Our learners are not the only ones who benefit from the tutoring as one of our Yipiyap tutors Jess explains:



Winifred Holtby students experienced a vastly different day at school with a day of workshops delivered by Prison Me! No Way!

The workshops were delivered by current and ex-prison officers, a current inmate serving a life sentence, representatives from the charity and even sniffer dogs. The workshop gave a first-hand insight into the prison environment, and what it would be like to work or, more grimly, to live in prison. The students were thoroughly engaged by the sessions, asking insightful and enlightening questions. Staff commented that it is an event that students remember throughout their time at school.

Students remarked that: "This is meaningful to me because Prison Me No Way sets an example of how not to make the wrong decisions and cause your life to turn in the wrong direction. When the prisoner was speaking, it made me feel as if he wanted us to be in his shoes to see and understand how his choices have made

Gail Rule, Head of Faculty for Social Sciences told us: "Our annual PMNW day provides students with an opportunity to meet – and learn from - people whose lives have been negatively impacted by the consequences of their choices in a setting outside of the formal curriculum and this makes the topics that bit more 'real' for our students. Another benefit for our students is gaining an understanding of some of the many varied career pathways within the criminal justice system and emergency services. Over the years, this continues to be

one of the events that students remember; we even have ex-students, whose own children now attend Winifred Holtby Academy, recalling their PMNW experience."

Students from all four of our Trust
Sixth Forms spent an informative two
days at the University of Hull learning
about their post-18 options and
soaking up a taste of university life.

Year 12 students attended the Humberside UCAS Exhibition with 78 universities present at Hull University for students to speak to. UCAS Exhibitions are a crucial part of students' post-16 journey as they help students explore a wide range of academic and career opportunities and discover a future that's right for them.

On the second day, Year 12 returned for the 'This Is Hull' schools event. Students had the opportunity to meet with staff and students from their chosen fields ranging from the Faculties of Business, Law and Politics to Hull York Medical School and attend lectures. After sessions, they

had the opportunity to explore the campus where exciting activities were going on, such as accommodation tours, societies fair and street food stalls.

In addition to this, students could drop into a range of workshops in state-of-the-art facilities such as trading on a real-time Bloomberg trading floor or learning about the Forest School Approach with the School of Education.

Students said that they really appreciated the opportunity to speak to different universities that they may not have considered before at the UCAS convention and to experience university level teaching in the taster session.

Phoebe Bastani, President of the Hull University Students Union said "It's been great to be part of the 'This Is Hull' week where we've welcomed thousands of Sixth Form College students onto our beautiful, vibrant, and welcoming campus. They certainly brought the weather with them too!"
