We are extremely pleased with 95% of attendees indicating the event was improved on last year's based on the 334 responses received. Our appreciation goes to our colleagues who facilitated workshops. Every school in the organisation was represented and without those colleagues the event would not have been a success. The central team would like to acknowledge the number of positive comments they received either on the day or through the feedback. Working together we will Shape Positive Futures for our 8000 children.

Although the agenda for the teacher meetings in the afternoon had been shared, from the feedback received it is apparent that this was not communicated clearly enough to everyone.

Action: The agenda for future meetings will be sent out directly to all colleagues.

Colleagues appreciated the variety of workshops, with a number asking for more subject specific workshops.

Action: Department leaders to be consulted during the Summer Term to discover what subject specific training they would like at the event.

Although there were many positives comments about the keynote speaker, there was some constructive criticism as well. When organising an event for over 1000 colleagues there is always going to be a variety of opinions. A common piece of feedback was about the length of the keynote speaker sessions.

Action: Keynote speakers in the future will be a maximum of an hour in length.

The team were happy with the sessions delivered for the Teaching and Learning and Pastoral Support staff. However, both from the feedback received and from our own observations, the Support Staff day was comparatively short of relevant workshop options.

Action: Support Staff to be consulted in the Summer Term to discover what training they would like at the event.

ECTs in the spotlight...



As the Autumn term draws to a close it is wonderful to reflect on the progress we have made as a team.

Since our ECT Welcome meeting in September, I have very much enjoyed visiting schools to meet with ECTs in small groups and engage in reflective and evaluative conversations. The team have shared, with enthusiasm, insights into their experiences.

Year 1 ECTs have been busy establishing themselves at the start of their teaching career. Whilst some trained within the school they are currently employed, for most, they are new to the team and have been busy getting to know their colleagues, the learners, school systems, and processes. For Year 2 ECTs, the majority had joined the Trust last academic year.

A crucial aspect of the entitlement for two years of professional development underpinned by the early career framework (ECF) is the mentor-mentee relationship. Year 1 ECTs and mentors engage in regular lesson drop ins followed by instructional coaching conversations. For Year 2 ECTs, the focus very much surrounds phase and subject, with ECTs and mentors working together on half termly development cycles. Each school ECT team is also supported by a committed and enthusiastic Induction Tutor. Thank you to all ECTs, mentors and Induction Tutors for your hard work and efforts this term.

Our ECT Committee Board has been launched and this includes representation from ECTs, mentors, Induction Tutors, and the Trust ECT Lead. Our first meeting was very successful in providing a channel through which members could communicate ideas for future development and provision.

Next term we look forward to our first formal ECT cross Trust networking events. These will be held in January and demonstrate our commitment to development of ECTs through opportunity to engage in peer-to-peer support.

Additionally, Christmas boxes will be delivered to our ECT teams during the last week of term. We hope they enjoy the treats whilst celebrating their successes.

Tell us a little about your placement with The Consortium Academy Trust. What were the highlights and challenges?

Duke of Edinburgh Award Celebration Evening DE THE DUKE OF DE CONBURGH'S AWARD

November saw Hessle's first ever 'Duke of Edinburgh Award Celebration Evening'.

It was wonderful to share the students' experiences and achievements with their parents and fellow staff members. It was a far cry from when I took over the leadership of the award programme in October 2019, when it was in a fairly moribund state with a handful of students enrolled but little sense of what they were going to be doing and who was going to organise it. It was a massive learning curve for me, but I was ready for the challenge as all good DofE people are!

Three years on, and despite a pandemic, the programme is in fantastic health, and, in November, we had the opportunity to celebrate this success with students, staff and parents. Hayley Singleton, from the Duke of Edinburgh Award, handed out the certificates to the students. Two

participants were given special awards for outstanding achievement. As well as the traditional Duke of Edinburgh certificate each participant was given a special COVID Certificate of Achievement to recognise that they had achieved their Duke of Edinburgh Award under difficult circumstances.

During the event, I shared some key numbers with the guests, and they make for remarkable reading. This year we have:

- 55 students have so far successfully completed either the Bronze (44 students) or Silver (11) Awards (88 in total since October 2019)
- 792 hours of volunteering have been completed
- 1320 hours of physical activity
- 660 hours of skill learning
- And a total of 2772 miles walked in expeditions - the equivalent of walking to Bergushad in Azerbaijan

This could not be achieved without the support of Michelle Edwards, Paul Scott and other member of the Hessle Academy staff. Twenty-four members of staff voluntary gave up their time to help support our young people to achieve their awards. All 55 of our students embodied all of our school values: aspiration, integrity, kindness, respect, responsibility and resilience.

If evidence was needed of the impact of this, of the 55 families invited to the celebration on Monday, 52 of them attended, showing how much this is valued by all concerned.

This year we have 42 students working towards their Bronze Award and 16 working towards their Silver Award. This is just the beginning.
